## ABOUT THE CORONADO STATE HISTORIC SITE

In 1540 a force of Spanish soldiers and Indian allies from New Spain, led by Francisco Vásquez de Coronado, entered the middle Rio Grande Valley of New Mexico in search of the fabled Seven Cities of Gold. This area, which the Spanish would call the Tiguex Province, was home to thousands of individuals living in a dozen or more adobe villages, or pueblos. The remnants of the northernmost pueblo, known today as Kuaua, are preserved at the Coronado State Historic Site located in the city of Bernalillo, just north of Albuquerque. The Historic Site is a nationally recognized treasure and home to one of the greatest archaeological discoveries in the American Southwest.

In the mid-1930s, in preparation for the reconstruction of the ancestral pueblo, archeologists made a discovery that would become one of the great treasures of New Mexico and the pride of the Coronado Historic Site. While excavating a kiva (underground chamber) that had been buried for centuries, the archaeologists found its walls were adorned with many layers of colorful paintings, or murals. These murals, estimated to be between 500 and 600 years old, are among the oldest indigenous art on display in the United States. The Painted Kiva was reconstructed, and one of the mural layers was recreated inside it by Native artist Ma-Pe-Wi.

Today the Coronado Historic Site is the only museum in the world with original kiva art on display. Visitors may take a guided tour of the Painted Kiva and view the original murals in the site's museum. The museum also exhibits prehistoric and historic Puebloan and Spanish colonial artifacts and offers interactive learning for all ages via the "Sim Pueblo", an archaeology game, and an iPhone™ application.

## Letter from the President

### Looking back on a successful year . . .

This past year has been an interesting time for the Friends of Coronado and the Coronado Historic Site. Both have faced new challenges. The year 2016 saw severe cuts in State funding and a major reorganization within the New Mexico Department of Cultural Affairs, which oversees historic sites. This reorganization resulted in the loss of our Site Manager, Scott Smith; the consolidation of the Jemez and Coronado Historic Sites into a new regional organization; and the coming of a new manager, Matthew Barbour.

These changes brought new challenges to the Historic Site. But the support of Friends' members enabled us to fund new exhibits, provide items for educational outreach, and donate thousands of volunteer hours in support of the Historic Site and its staff. The 2016 Fiesta of Cultures was our most successful to date with over 860 visitors. Volunteers working with Ranger Ethan Ortega photographed, analyzed, and inventoried over 62,000 artifacts and digitized over 4,000 pages of field notes from early excavations of Kuaua Pueblo. The Friends were able to continue our education program with eight lectures. And for those wanting something a little different, the Friends sponsored ten field trips and three hikes.

### ... and ahead to 2017

Thanks to member donations and sales in Sun Father's Gift Shop, the Friends finished 2016 in a strong financial position. This is fortunate because we think State funding for the Historic Site will be just as tight in 2017 as last year. Our goals for 2017 are to fund new exhibits, the final phase of Painted Kiva restoration, and docent and outreach programs; to support ongoing research; and to create a scholarship for research projects pertaining to the Historic Site.

## Looking Back, Looking Ahead

### Overview

During 2016, the Friends of Coronado Historic Site strove to foster a deep appreciation for the Pueblo, Hispanic, and Anglo cultures of New Mexico through docent-led site tours, lectures, field trips, workshops, and events for both Friends members and the general public. Friends activities contributed to a steady increase in visitation to the Historic Site. Members also provided much-needed advocacy to the New Mexico Department of Cultural Affairs and State legislators.

A particularly exciting development involved research activities conducted by Friends volunteers. Their reexamination of Kuaua artifacts excavated over 75 years ago promises a more nuanced understanding of the origins and development of this ancestral pueblo and the daily life of its inhabitants. It also offers a tantalizing glimpse into other cultures who used the site before and after the pueblo's heyday.

As always, Friends members also had fun — enjoying the good fellowship that comes from sharing knowledge, participating in activities that stretch the mind and body, and working towards the common goal of discovering and preserving the past.

## 2016 Programs

### Lectures

As part of public outreach and educational efforts, the Friends of Coronado sponsored eight educational lectures with over 450 people attending. The lectures provided the opportunity to increase the understanding of New Mexico's varied cultures and complex history. Our lecture series has continued to be popular and serves as an effective tool to recruit new Friends members and inspire existing members.

## **Major 2016 Events**

#### Fiesta of Cultures

The Friends of Coronado's eleventh annual Fiesta of Cultures was held on October 15, 2016, and was enjoyed by over 860 attendees. The Fiesta featured traditional Pueblo, Anglo, and Spanish crafts — including demonstrations of Pueblo pottery making, fiber arts, and blacksmithing — as well as 36 multicultural craft and food vendors, a Spanish settlers' encampment, a llama exhibit, an exhibit by Hawks Aloft, and children's activities. Live entertainment was provided by the Five Sandoval Indian Pueblos-Head Start children's dancers and the Harvier Family Dancers from Santa Clara Pueblo. Docent-led and self-

guided tours of the Historic Site were also available. This event not only paid for itself, but netted a small profit, a rare achievement for events at any New Mexico Historic Site.

### Special Recognition:

## Friends of Coronado Volunteers Win 2016 Bice Award

The Archaeological Society of New Mexico awarded the 2016 Richard A. Bice Award for Archaeological Achievement to Friends volunteers Carolyn Gilmore and Deborah Ellis in recognition of their significant improvements to archaeological collections at the Maxwell Museum of Anthropology at the University of New Mexico.

Carolyn and Deborah, together with teams they recruited and led, reorganized artifacts from the ancestral pueblos of Kuaua and Santiago (Puaray) by cataloguing, labelling, and photographing thousands of ceramics and developing reference materials for use by Museum staff and University students. The volunteers also created archival support rings for the ceramics and placed the vessels in archival storage containers.

The Friends of Coronado are proud to have donated \$300 to purchase the support rings, reducing the potential for damage to these priceless artifacts.

## **Lights of Kuaua**

More than 1,000 traditional luminarias lined pathways and illuminated the structures of the Coronado Historic Site during this evening event on December 4, 2016. Over 780 visitors heard nineteenth century holiday favorites performed by the New Mexico Territorial Brass Band and watched traditional Native American dances around a raging bonfire on the south plaza of the pueblo. The Friends of Coronado provided volunteer staffing and \$1,300 in funding for this event.

## Direct Benefits Provided to the Coronado State Historic Site in 2016

Each year the Coronado Historic Site receives extensive financial and volunteer contributions from the Friends of Coronado. The Friends group is widely viewed as the most successful organization of its kind within the Department of Cultural Affairs, Historic Sites Division.

#### Direct Benefits to Coronado Historic Site in 2016

Volunteerism: More than 10,000 volunteer labor hours donated during 2016.

**Total financial support**: Donated *over \$21,600* to support major events, programs, educational activities, exhibit upgrades, research, and site enhancement

**Sun Father's Gift Shop**: Sales exceeded \$35,700 in 2016, netting *more than \$25,600* after expenses.

#### Docent program:

- Conducted hundreds of guided tours of the Historic Site and Painted Kiva in 2016
- \* Recruited and trained five new docents; purchased training materials
- \* All docents are Friends member volunteers.

### Major events support:

- Presented the Fiesta of Cultures (over 860 attendees)
- Donated \$1,300, provided volunteers for the Lights of Kuaua (over 780 attendees).

**Summer programs**: Donated \$775 for summer educational programs at the Historic Site, including wildlife demonstrations, speakers, and traditional crafts such as pottery making, flint knapping, and textile arts.

**Site enhancement**: Purchased seeds for Native Garden, books for Site Library, and paint for damaged black band in the Painted Kiva, among many other items.

**Research**: Friends volunteers devoted hundreds of hours cataloguing, labelling, and photographing ceramics from Kuaua and Santiago (Puaray) pueblos in the collections of the Maxwell Museum of Anthropology, earning the 2016 Bice Award for archaeological achievement in New Mexico.

## **Friends of Coronado Organization**

### **About the Friends**

The Friends of Coronado Historic Site is a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organization officially formed on May 7, 2003. This Report summarizes the thirteenth year of operations since incorporation. There were 349 Friends members as of December 31, 2016. The By-Laws of the organization were last amended in May 2016. The Friends Mission Statement (see page two of this report) was updated in April 2016.

### **Board of Directors**

Jim Conder (President), Pat Harris (Corresponding Secretary/Email Announcements), Marty Kuehn (Membership Chairman), and Billy Lawrence (Treasurer) were elected to the Board at the Annual Meeting on January 17, 2016.

At its February 24, 2016, meeting, the Board elected: Brian Gilmore (President), Ron Overley (Vice President/Trips Chairman), and Billy Lawrence (Treasurer). Jim Conder continued on the Board as President Emeritus/Member-at-Large. Other positions: Patt Cain (Secretary), Carolyn Gilmore (Gift Shop Manager), Marty Kuehn (Membership Chairman),

Charron McFadden (Publicity Chairman), GlennTaylor (Lectures Chairman), and Barbara Williams (Newsletter Editor). Secretary Patt Cain, Treasurer Billy Lawrence, and Lectures Chairman Glenn Taylor resigned during the year. They were replaced on an acting basis by Kate Hora, Tom Harris, and George Swenson, respectively.

Board members serve three-year terms. Regular Board meetings are held at the Coronado State Historic Site at 9:30 a.m., usually on the fourth Thursday of each month, and are open to all members.

### **Finances and Fundraising**

The Friends of Coronado enjoyed another financially successful year in 2016. The group raised over \$49,000 to support the Historic Site; expenditures for the year totaled over \$21,600. Primary revenue sources for 2016 were, in descending order: Gift Shop, membership dues, programs and events, and donations. Primary expenditure categories were, in descending order: Cost of goods sold in the Gift Shop, events and programs, historic site enhancement, and administration (includes insurance). The bank balance was \$29,967 as of December 31, 2016. A detailed financial report is available upon request.

Sun Father's Gift Shop continued to provide selected Native American-made and Southwestern-themed merchandise for visitors. Managed and staffed entirely by Friends volunteers, the Gift Shop is the largest revenue source for the Friends of Coronado, grossing over \$38,900 and generating a net profit of more than \$25,600 in 2016.
